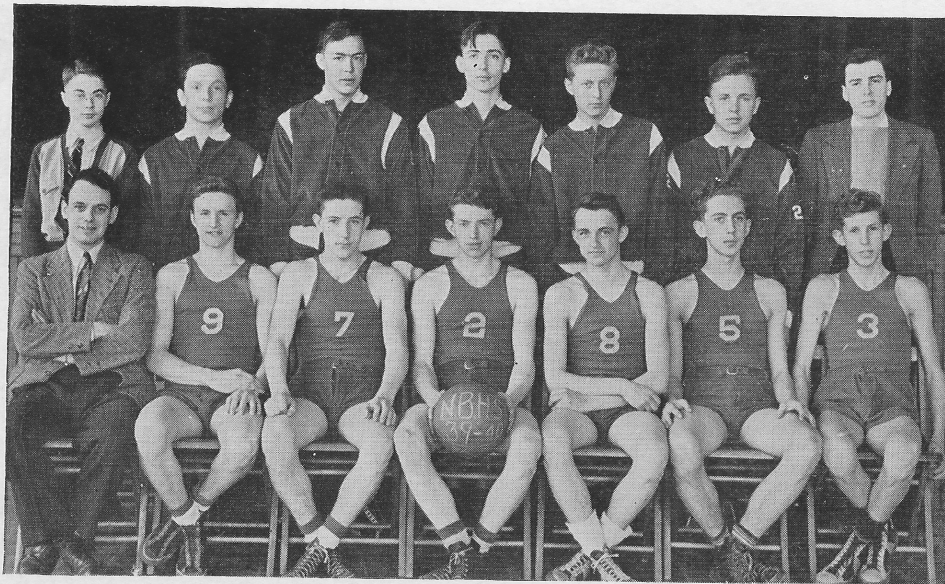

## GIRLS' SPORTS

North Bennington High School offers many sports for the girl's athletic program.

The fall sport is hockey in which twenty-four girls took part. During the hockey season the North Bennington Team challenged teams from other schools, including Wilmington and Burr and Burton, both on their fields and on our own field. Although our scores never preceded our opponents, we had a great deal of fun in playing these games and some of the girls made lasting friendships.

Basketball is the outstanding winter sport. This year about fifteen girls signed up for basketball. They had practice every school night. For some years our basketball teams have taken part in the Taconic League. The North Bennington girls held the championship for the past three years. This year the girls had a fine team but they were not as successful as in the previous years.

Skiing was also a popular winter sport this year. The skiiers were required to spend at least eighty minutes a week skiing which made up for the time that they would otherwise have spent in gym class.

Tennis, volley ball and softball are the most popular in the spring sports. Volley ball and softball are played in the school yard during the gym class period. Tennis is played on the community court which is near the school and is therefore played during the gym period.

Throughout the year gym classes are held consisting of two gym classes a week of forty minutes each.

One of the two gym periods is spent entirely for exercises and marching and preparing for the annual gym exhibition. The second gym period is given to games such as table tennis, badminton, volley ball and float ball.

All girls are required to enter into some one of the sports offered unless they have poor health. A doctor's excuse is presented to those who are unable to take gym. Our school is fortunate to have but a very few whose health does not allow them to take some gym sport.



## BOYS' SPORTS

In the past the usual fall sport was soccer. However, the last two years touch football has replaced soccer. It was introduced by Mr. Lonergan and has been growing in popularity ever since. A tournament was held at Welling Field with the four high school classes participating. The tournament covered a period of about six weeks, with



the sophomores finally defeating the seniors in the final game.

Six-man football was also introduced this year. Although no uniforms were available for games with other schools, the squad held several practice sessions at Welling Field. It is hoped that next year the school can buy uniforms and that games can be arranged with other schools.

The 1939-1940 basketball season proved to be the most successful season in many years. Three first string men were lost last year, but Coach Lonergan was aided by the sophomore class which placed six men on the Varsity. At the opening of the season the outlook was rather unfavorable. However, after losing the first two games, the team won six successive victories. At this point everyone had hopes of winning the Taconic League Championship. The team had won one game from Wilmington High School and lost one to the same team. At the end of the League games Wilmington and North Bennington were tied for first place and therefore a playoff was necessary. The playoff game was played at the Bennington High School Gymnasium with Wilmington High victorious by a score of 33—23. However, the season was a success with the team winning seven and losing six. This is more than a hundred per cent improvement over last year's record. In addition to the sophomores, the varsity was composed of three seniors and two juniors.

The Junior Varsity was not so successful as they won only one game. The team was composed of freshman and sophomores who were playing basketball for the first time.

The basketball season closed with the class games. The Varsity men were not allowed to play. The games were designed to give the boys who were not out for basketball a chance to play. The eighth grade and the sophomores reached the finals from which the eighth grade emerged victorious. The outcome of the class games showed that the outlook for future teams is brighter than it has been in quite some time. All of these games were officiated by members of the Varsity team, to acquaint them better with the rules.

This year's baseball season should prove to be quite successful. Almost all of last year's Varsity are returning with third base the only vacant position. Last year's record shows defeats. The team batting average for last year was .373 while the fielding average was .696.

This year a tennis team will be formed and games will be played with nearby schools.

## EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT IN NORTH BENNINGTON

The first literary instruction of Sage's City (the present North Bennington) was in the district school, opposite Colonel Walbridge's house, now known as A. S. Payne's. The building was afterwards torn down and a brick building occupied by Mr. Frederick Welling, as a residence, was built and equipped for school purposes. This served as a school house until the graded district was formed. Shortly after this, owing to the growth of the village, it became necessary to form another district known as the yellow district.

During the period from the settlement of the village to the formation of the Academy Society, there were several private schools. One was situated where Mr. Lyons' barber shop now stands; another was located between Fred Babson's house and W. R. White apartment house; and for several years was conducted in the Dady Hall. This Hall was located on West Street.

The present school building was erected in 1870 at a cost of about \$12,000 on School Street, which was newly opened for the purpose by the Hon. T. W. Park, who donated the lot for the building, dug the cellar and built the foundation. These gifts made it possible for the district to build the school at the low price of \$12,000. This original building consisted of two rooms on the ground floor and two rooms on the second floor.

In 1878 the Shaftsbury district was annexed to the North Bennington Graded School District. The building which was considered of ample size when constructed, was then found to be too small to accommodate all the pupils. It was found necessary to increase its capacity by finishing off the basement into two rooms. This gave the needed room but not the best of sanitation.

In 1898 the basement rooms, having been condemned by the Board of Health as unfit for school rooms, it was found necessary to build an addition of sufficient size to furnish two rooms of the same size as those in the old building, with hall and stairway leading to upper rooms. At the annual school meeting in March, 1898, the Prudential Committee was instructed by vote of the meeting to build an annex to the old building agreeable to the plans and specifications already furnished, the cost not to exceed \$5,000. The annex was accordingly built at an expense of a little less than the limit. It was heated by steam, the committee having installed a boiler thirteen feet long, and a system of ventilation which was by authority declared to be perfect. It was furnished with modern desks, slate blackboards, a laboratory, proper apparatus, a piano and all the appliances necessary to constitute a first class school.

In 1914 the faculty was composed of a principal, three high school teachers and three graded school teachers. Up until 1917 there were nine years of the elementary school and four years of senior high school. After this date when a Junior High School was inaugurated, the elementary school consisted of only six grades and the seventh and eighth grades became the junior high school. A Home Economics department was established in this same year. In 1923 running water was installed and boys and girls basements were constructed in the basement.

In the middle 1920's it became very evident that the school building was inadequate due to the rapidly increasing enrollment. After many plans had been considered an appropriation of \$50,000 was voted in 1930 for an addition to be built. This addition consisted of six classrooms and a gymnasium and auditorium with showers, locker rooms and stage making possible physical education, dramatic and musical departments. The excellent stage accessories and gym equipment were furnished through the efforts of the Community Players and Alumni Association. After this improvement the school was rated by the State Department of Education as a superior school and has maintained this rating to the present time.

Through the efforts of interested parents and friends a kindergarten was inaugurated in 1929. This was held for one year in the Congregational Church and after that it was transferred to the school building. The kindergarten was continued by the parents and friends until 1935, when it was taken over by the school district.

In 1937 the agricultural department of the high school was expanded and a full time teacher was employed. The facilities of the department were increased by the purchase of the Nash Blacksmith Shop for both a classroom and shop.

The Home Economics course was revised in 1938 so that three extra hours of instruction were provided in that department.

The first class to graduate from North Bennington High School was in 1879, and since that time there have been five hundred and fifty-four students graduated including the class of 1939. At the present time there is a student enrollment of 370 with a faculty of sixteen.

The course of study is such that it is expected that any graduate of the school, having taken the full course, is fitted to enter college without further preparation.

The present officers of the School District are: Moderator, George Welling; Clerk, Nelson Payne; Prudential Committee, W. C. H. Cushman, J. C. Armstrong and Jesse L. Dunham.

North Bennington High School, one of the few Superior Schools in the state of Vermont, is approved by the New England College Entrance Board. The certificate of North Bennington High School will be accepted by all colleges accepting certificates. To obtain this certification, an average grade of at least 80% must be maintained in all subjects for which certification is sought.

The college or training institution which the pupil hopes to attend should be selected as early as possible in order to meet the requirements of that particular institution. All freshmen are urged to consult the principal at the beginning of the year in order to draw up a tentative four-year program. The principal, faculty members and class advisors are available at all times for individual conferences.

### Admission

Pupils may be enrolled in North Bennington High School at any time and will be placed in those classes to which their previous academic record justifies admission.

### Requirements for Graduation

Eighty-three credits, eighty of which must be received for completion of academic courses, are required for graduation.

The passing grade in all courses is 70%. Emphasis is laid on thoroughness of work.

At least one year of Home Economics, completed preferably during the first or second years, is required of each girl.

Physical education is required of each pupil unless a legitimate excuse, signed by the family physician, shows that the boy or girl is physically unable to participate in athletics. A pupil is otherwise excused from physical education classes only while he is a member of a varsity athletic team.

In addition to physical education and music each pupil must register for four subjects each year. By special arrangement with the principal, capable students may sometimes take five subjects.

Pupils must consult the principal before a subject may be dropped or exchanged for another course of study.

Sophomores and Juniors especially should note the alternating courses, in order that their programs be arranged to meet the necessary requirements for graduation and for the school which they plan to attend.



## VOCATIONAL COURSES

### Vocational Agriculture

The Vocational Agriculture Department of North Bennington High School is considered an asset to Bennington County, as it is the only school in southeastern Vermont that offers an agriculture course. The purpose of the course is not only to set up a standard of skills in farming operations through practice, but to teach the basic sciences and economics of management of farming and to develop an appreciation of rural life. Manual training, including the manipulation of hand tools, construction of articles of furniture and equipment, is also an important part of this course, which aims to meet the needs of those pupils who are interested, directly or indirectly, in an agricultural career.

### Home Economics

The Home Economics Department is now being operated on a vocational basis similar to the Vocational Agriculture. The instructor devotes her full time to the department. Not only does this department give instruction in cooking and sewing, as was traditional in Home Economics courses, but now the major emphasis is on Home Making. Units are taught and discussed in such fields as: child care and training, dietetics, interior decorating, household management, meal planning, care and repair of clothing. Girls receive credits for projects carried on at home in conjunction with their school discussions with the advice and supervision of their instructor. The theme of the department is to develop Home Making into an art.

### Extra-Curricular Activities

The curriculum of North Bennington High School affords the pupil not only an opportunity to prepare himself for entrance into colleges, universities, nurses' training schools, normal schools, business training schools, etc., but it also aims toward developing those characteristics which enable the individual, on completion of his high school course, to become a good citizen in his community, his state and his country.

As North Bennington High School has one of the best high school gymnasiums in Vermont an excellent physical education program, with an instructor for both boys and girls, is carried on under the supervision of the Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. The cooperative spirit, leadership and good sportsmanship are the goals of the physical education program.

The orchestra and glee clubs for both boys and girls afford training for those interested in music. Those organizations present annually an operetta and several concerts. Each spring they participate in the Vermont State Music Festival in Burlington.

Pupil-conducted assembly programs, prize speaking, debating, three-act plays, essay writing, research projects and journalism ( in connection with the weekly newspaper and the Senior Year Book ) are outgrowths of the English Classes.

The Tri-Y, Hi-Y and Junior Hi-Y Clubs, the Future Farmers of America, the Future Home-makers of America, the Monday Night Club for Boys, and class meetings give splendid opportunities to gain poise, self-confidence and experience in various fields.

Each pupil receives credit for taking part in one or more of these outside activities which are of practical value in preparing for later life.

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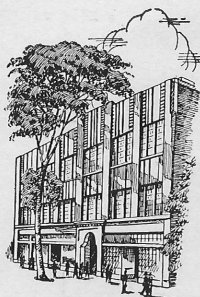
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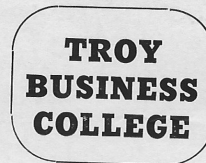

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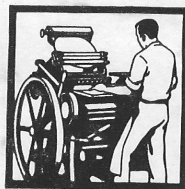
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
