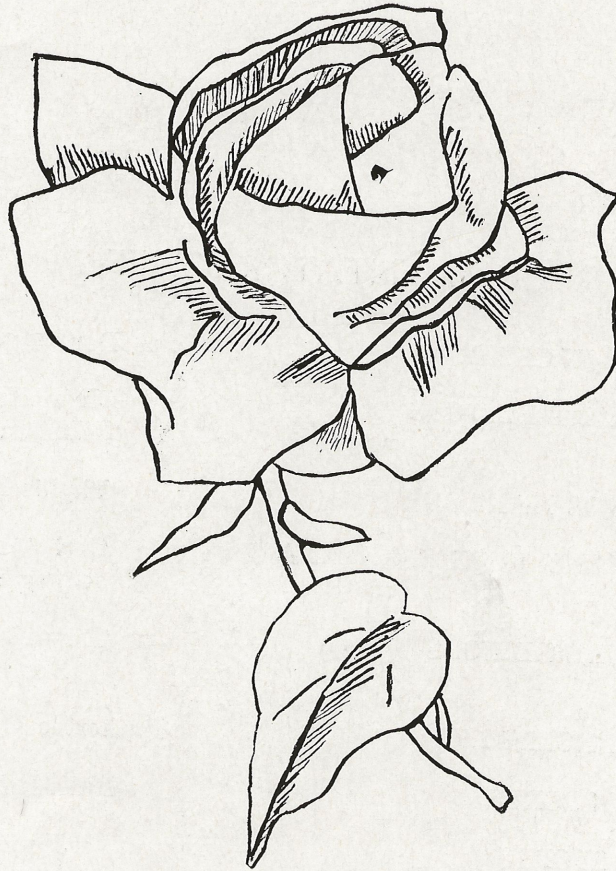

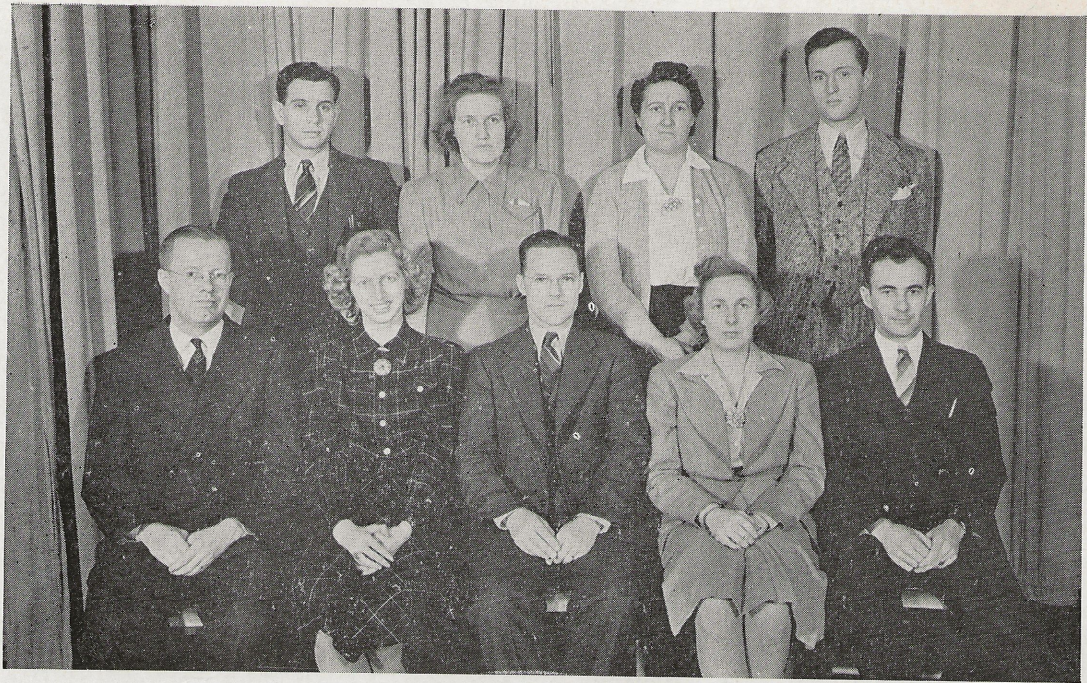
Foreword

Class History

Under the direction of Miss Thelma King, the English teacher, the play "Tom Sawyer" was presented and proved very successful. Everyone remembers the part he or she played in it and the play will be remembered as the first step in dramatics.

During the year our class received a new member, Wendell Green. Many students took part in such activities as basketball, Glee Club and "Spectator."

Returning as Sophomores the next year, the large class of forty-two members had to be divided, the more fortunate ones in study hall and the remainder in Room A. The officers chosen to carry the responsibilities were: President, Fred Driscoll; Vice-President, Robert Willard; Secretary, William Dailey; and Treasurer, Warren Jones.

After having initiated the Freshmen, to our great delight, the class settled down to more serious matters, some participating in the operetta "Star Flower" and others in the various organizations open to them.

At last spring came and nothing seemed to stop the dauntless Sophomores, not even those dreadful examinations in June. Vacation had finally come and nearly everyone made plans for returning in the fall.

With the thirty-six members reunited once more in study hall, as Juniors, the class elected Ruth Robinson as President; Arthur Simmons as Vice-President; Mary Walsh, Secretary; and Lloyd Pratt, Treasurer.

In October, many of us were wearing the new class rings and how proud we felt then! Many of us joined the new Drama Club and some were invited to become members of the Tri or Hi-Y.

The year seemed to pass very quickly as the successful operetta "Lady Frances" was presented and followed by the play "Holiday" given by the Drama Club. In "Holiday," one of our members had a major part, which was done very well.

In the Spring everyone thought of the Junior Prom, and for the first time in many years a Prom Queen, Dorothy Scott, was chosen.

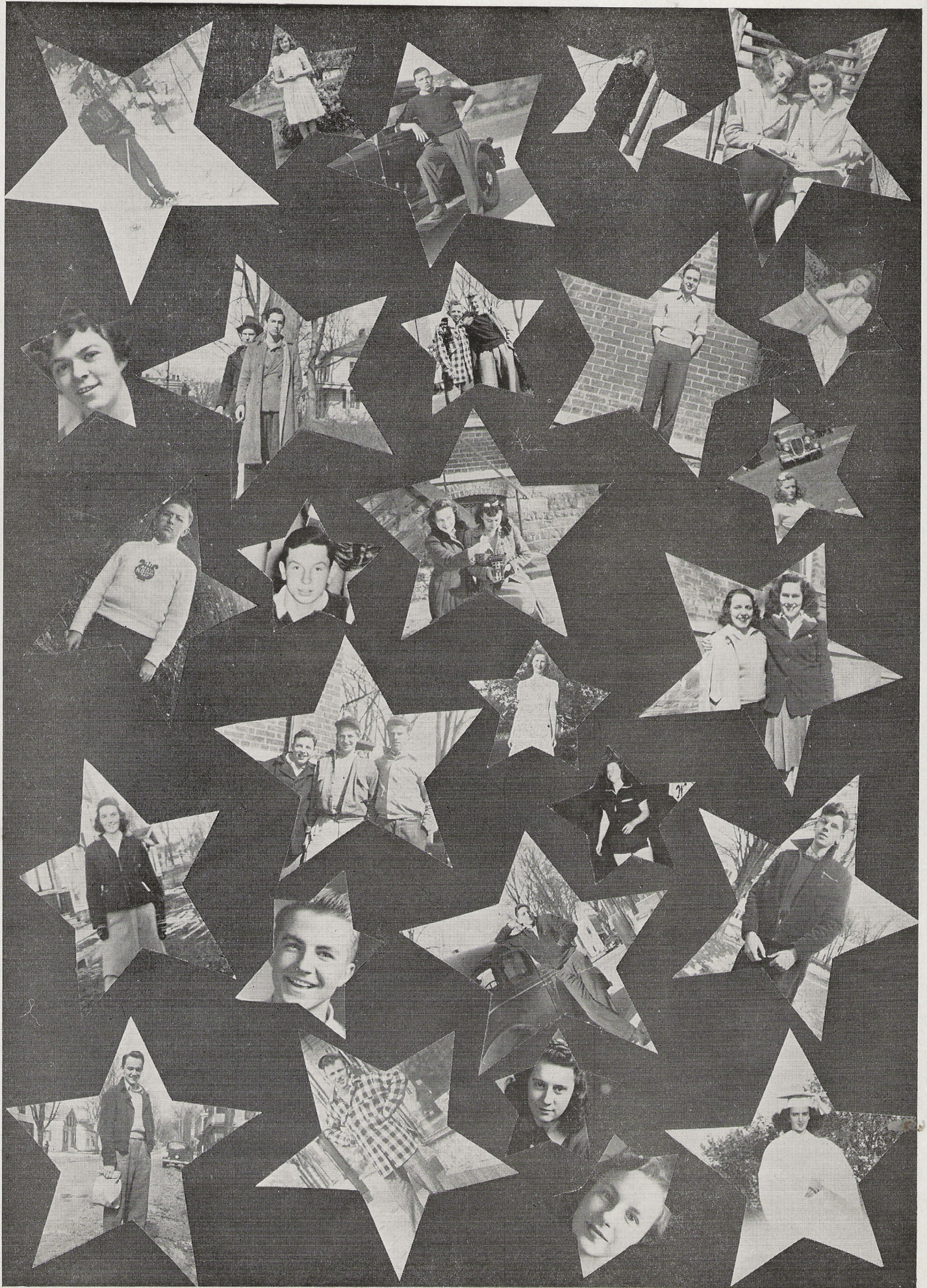

"The Varieties of 1942" was next on the list and this was followed by plans for a Senior Trip, in April, to our national capital, Washington, D. C. At this time, too, one member of our class entered the High School oratorical contest, competed in the finals at Montpelier, and did very well. Even though it was a small honor we felt proud that our school was represented.

Our last year was probably the most happy and meaningful, and it was difficult to think of parting. Our paths will be separated after graduation, which is June 4, and no one knows what the future will hold for us. For many, our four years of high school seemed very brief, but each knows whether he or she has accomplished a great deal, or not, and all of us will remember the pleasant hours spent together.

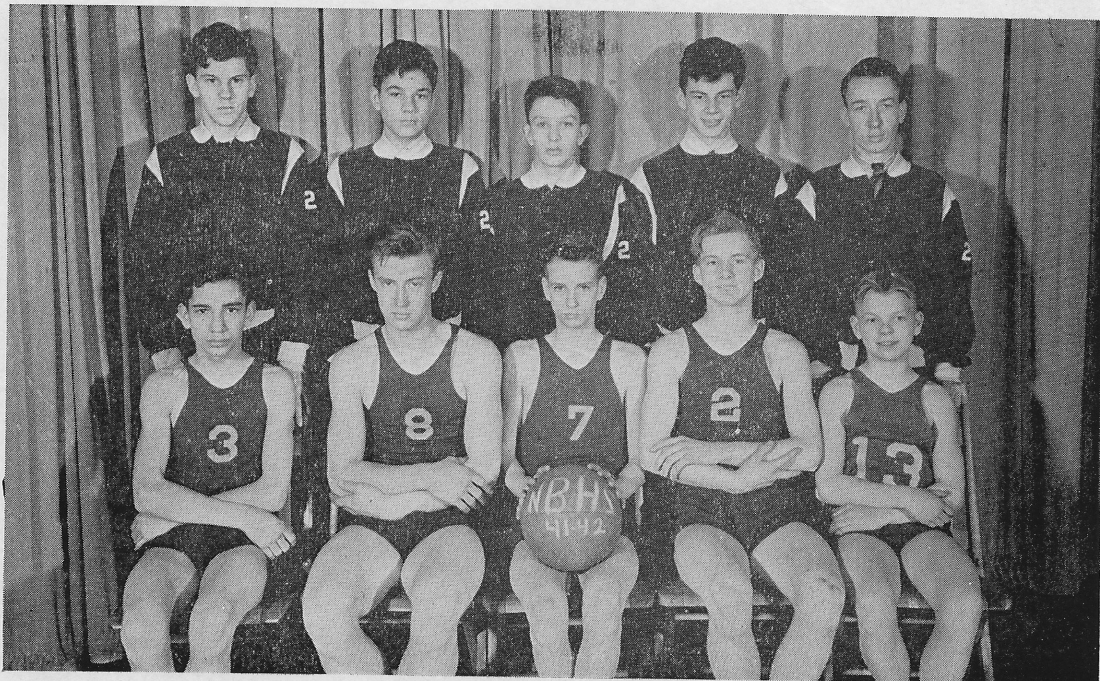

ANNUAL BULLETIN FOR 1942-43

Philosophy

The philosophy of North Bennington High School aims to adjust the school to meet the needs of the pupils. It takes into consideration individual differences, the development of well rounded personalities and preparation of the pupils to enter their many and varied fields of interest.

Admission

Any pupil who has been granted a certificate showing a satisfactory completion of the elementary requirements is gladly received into North Bennington High School. Pupils wishing to transfer to our school are welcomed and will be placed in those classes to which their previous academic record justifies admission.

Program

North Bennington High School is a Superior School and is approved by the New England College Entrance Board. Our program of studies includes the following departments: English, French, Latin, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Vocational Home Economics, Vocational Agriculture, Typing, Music and Physical Education.

Extra Curricular Activities

Music

Music offers opportunities in Orchestra and Glee Club for both boys and girls. This department has formed an organization known as the North Bennington High School Music Guild. This year the Guild has presented an operetta, "Words and Music," and a "Variety Show" as well as participating in the Vermont Musical Festival in Burlington.

Dramatics

The Mask and Dagger Dramatic Club is an active organization adding much to our extra curricular activity program. During the year it has initiated an Inter-Class One Act Play Contest. This year the Junior Class received a trophy cup which it will hold in its possession until the next annual contest. It offers experience in make-up, scenery and costume as well as actual play writing. The Dramatic Club entered the play "The Perfect Gentleman" in the Vermont State One Act Play Contest.

Physical Education

Physical Education is required of all students unless they are physically unfit or if they are members of a varsity athletic team. The State Department of Education is recommending that a well-balanced Physical Education Program be offered in all schools. The Physical Education Program offers opportunities in calisthenics—Volley Ball—Field Hockey (girls)—tumbling—modern dance—basketball—baseball—touch football—soccer. This is made possible by the Y. M. C. A. Department of Bennington and the coaches of North Bennington High School.

Improvements

Numerous improvements about the building have been made. Fluorescent lighting has been installed in the Science Laboratory and the addition of gas has also added greatly to the utility of the Science Department.

The halls of the building, which were formerly dark gray, have been greatly improved in appearance, by a coat of white paint. This has given a much lighter appearance.

A combination storage and lunch cupboard has been built.

An electric stove and pressure cooker have been added to the Home Economics equipment. This department has also taken on a more cheerful atmosphere with the appearance of new draperies and the rearrangement of furniture.

The desks in Room A and the floors in the halls have been sanded and refinished.

The school library has been supplemented by a number of new books including an unabridged Webster's Dictionary.

New typewriters have been purchased so that the Juniors and Seniors may have an opportunity to take a "Personal Typing Course."

Guidance

Special effort has been made that the pupils may receive guidance throughout their high school career. The Otis Mental Ability Test has been given to all pupils to determine their I. Q. as a guide for the faculty, relative to what may be expected from each pupil. A Vocational Analysis Test has been given to each pupil to help determine his vocational interest. The Seniors have also been given a Mechanical Aptitude Test sent out by the state.

A study of each student's personality has proven very interesting and in many cases worthwhile improvements have been noted.

A cumulative record system has been adopted which covers the pupil's scholastic work for the four years, the extra curricular activities in which he has participated, a summary of family data, his vocational choices, and a follow up program. To all this is attached a recent photograph of the student. This complete record is invaluable to the pupil as future reference.

Literary Publications

The school paper, "The Spectator," which is published weekly in The Bennington Evening Banner, affords excellent opportunity in journalism.

"The Commentator" is the yearbook published by the Senior Class.

Home Economics

The Homemaking program endeavors to help the student realize that the many parts of personal and home living make a whole rather than separate phases of life. With the everchanging conditions the daily emphasis must be constantly adjusted. The traditional foods and clothing are supplemented by child care, interior decorating, family relations, household management, home nursing and gardening. Home projects are carried out in conjunction with the classroom discussions to give the girls wider and more varied experiences. The theme of the department is to develop Homemaking into an art.

Agriculture

The ultimate aim of vocational agriculture is to assist those taking the course in the establishment of farming. Their aptitude for and ability in farming is shown through the work which they do in their supervised farming programs. These programs consist of one major farm enterprise and several minor or contributing enterprises. These farming programs are chosen by the boy and supervised by his parents and teacher.

The chief basis for teaching vocational agriculture is to "learn by doing." The theory and facts are taught first and then followed up by actual experience in programs of supervised farm practice. Those who are interested in farming may well be on their way toward establishment following high school.

Requirements for Graduation

Sixteen academic points plus one point gained by extra curricular activities are required for graduation.

The passing grade in all courses is 70%. The certification grade of 85% is recommended for college.

Four years of English and one year of American History are required for graduation. At least one year of Home Economics completed preferably during the first or second years, is required of each girl.

Pupils must consult the principal before a subject may be dropped or exchanged for another course of study.

Sophomores and Juniors, especially, should note the alternating courses, in order that their programs be arranged to meet the necessary requirements for graduation and for the school which they plan to attend.

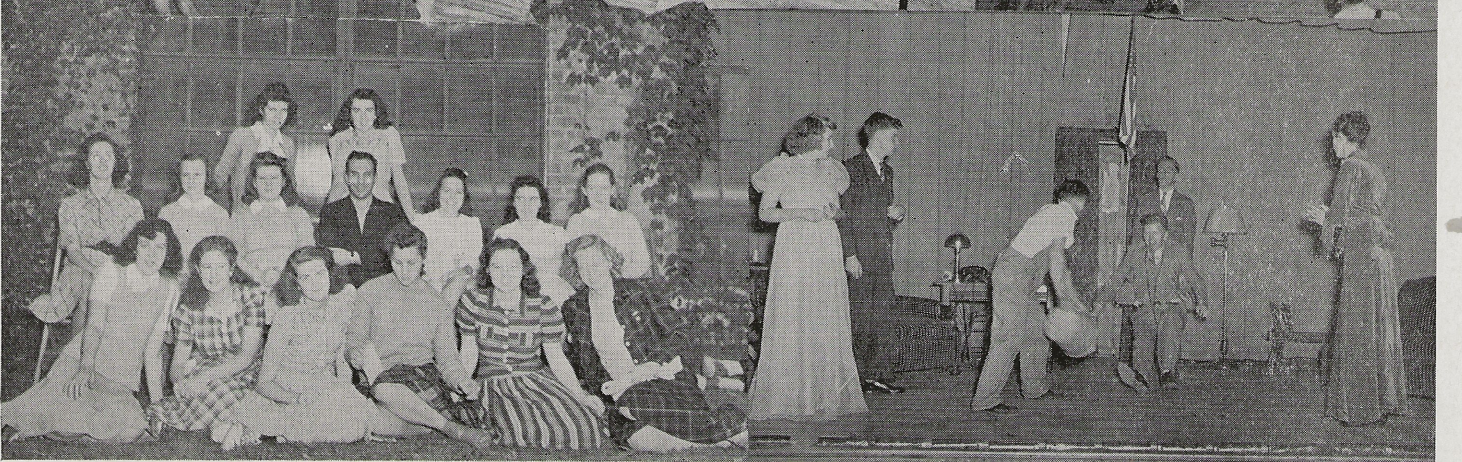
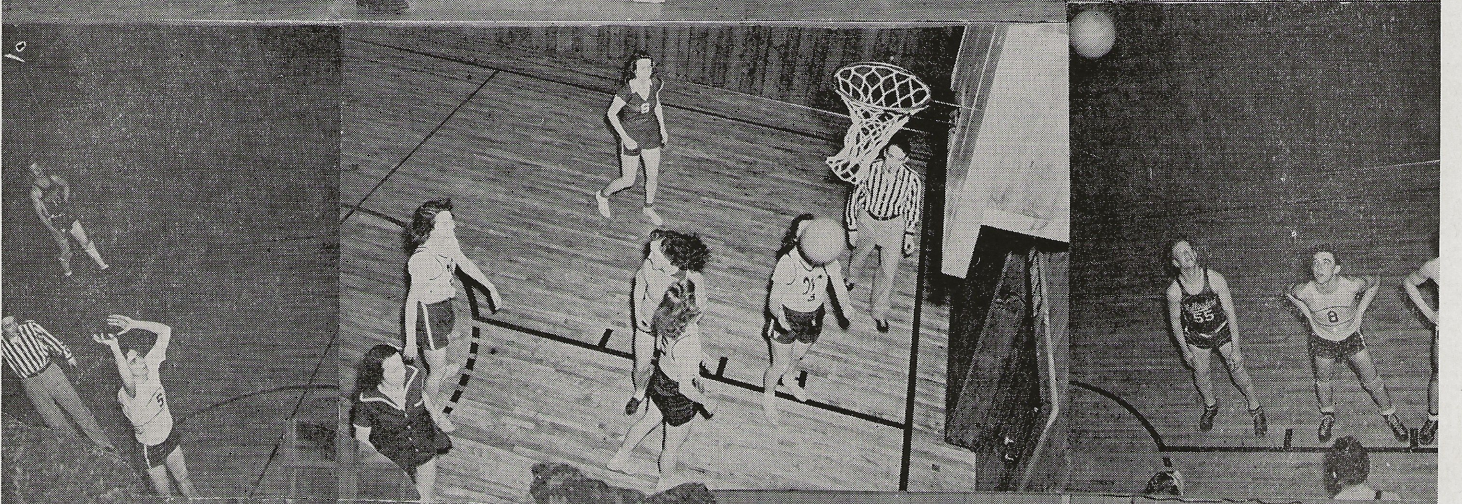

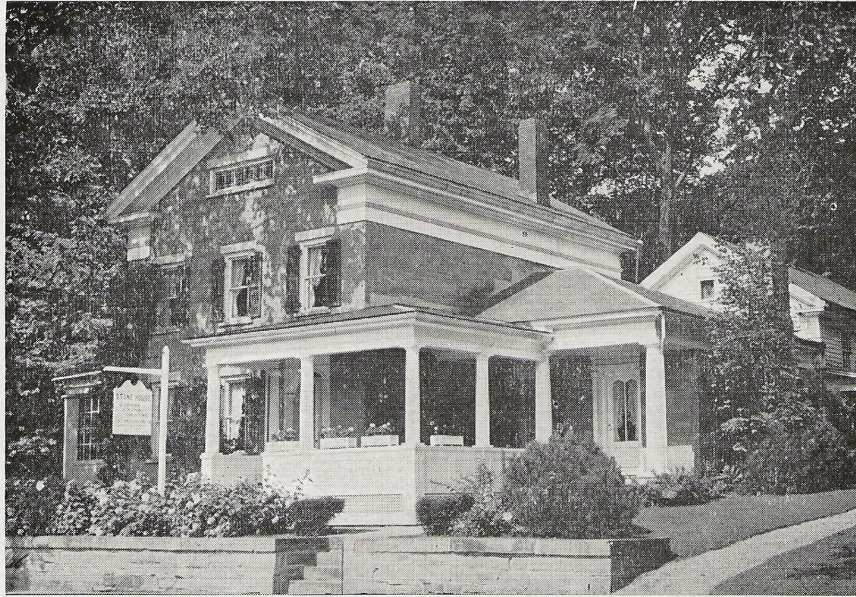
